# 1 Introduction

Fisheries and at-sea Certificate Holders (CH) in the Marine Stewardship Council (MSC) program are required to provide a self-description of policies and measures, including regulatory requirements and procedures that are in effect in the Unit of Assessment, to protect fishing crew from forced labour or child labour, as well as any efforts by the private sector. The objective is to require certificate holders to communicate how government, industry, or other relevant entities protect against forced or child labour.

The client group of the Northeast Atlantic blue whiting Pelagic Trawl fishery consists of the following UoC's:

- Pelagic Freezer-trawler Association,
- Danish Pelagic Producxer Organization
- Killybegs Fishermen's Organization
- Scottish Pelagic Sustainibility Group
- Compagnie des Pêches St Malo

The organizations within this client group have decided for a joint MSC certification of their blue whiting fishery, albeit under individual UoC's. Cost sharing of the costs related to the MSC certification process is agreed on the basis of available blue whiting quota per UoC.

- Describe the relationship between cost sharing members of the fishery client group and the vessel owners and operators of the Unit of Certification (UoC).

The PFA UoC consists of a group of ship owning companies active in pelagic fisheries with freezer-trawlers with vessels flying the flag of 6 EU member states (Netherlands, Germany France, UK, Lithuania and Poland). The PFA share of the costs related to the MSC certification process are shared by the member companies of the PFA.

Apart from the joint MSC certificates the organizations in the client group for this fishery are collaborating in various fields, such as scientific projects and consultations on fisheries management. All organizations are also member of the Northern Pelagic Working Group by which group these collective activities are organized.

### 2 Responsibility for labour regulation

- What management authorities and laws, including flag state authorities, control labour-related regulations in the unit of assessment area?

Regarding prevention of child labour and/or forced labour the ILO conventions C182 (on child labour) and C138 (on minimum age) and C029 (on forced labour) have been ratified by all flag state governments of the PFA UoC.

The C188 ILO Work in fishing convention covers provisions on decent working conditions in fisheries and has been ratified by France, Lithuania, UK. The Netherlands will ratify C188 during 2019. In Germany the Maritime Labour Convention is applied for fishing vessels, which is equivalent to C188.

De flag state governments and its implementing bodies have the responsibility of implementing these legislations including the monitoring aspect by inspection and enforcement.



3 Risk identification and mitigation Describe the processes, including government and certificate holder measures, that are in place in the UoC to identify and mitigate any risk of child and forced labour. During the regular insepctions on fishing vessels by the above mentioned givernemntal bodies these authorities will also look into signals of child and forced labour. With regard to the Work in Fishing Convcvention the authorities issue valid document to fishing vessels that state these vessels meet the requrementms of the C188 convention (and of the MLC for Germany). CH 4 Crew recruitment Describe the typical methods used to recruit crew in the UoC and describe the migrant composition of crew if any. The basic route of recruiting is the regular employment by the ship-owners in which case the crew is employed on a permanent basis. This recruitment of personnel is done per flag state of the PFA UoC. All flag states use minimum requirements for safe manning of the vessels. This results in employing flag state nationals with the required certificates of competence. In addition to this the ship-owners of the UoC make use of international crew. These are usually employed through manning agents specialized in the maritime and fishing industry. If we look at the crew composition a number of vessels in the PFA UoC have a crew composed in large majority of nationalities from the flag states concerned. In other cases the basic crew of the vessel has the nationality of the flag state extended by crew with mostly Russian or Peruvian nationality. CH 5 Engagement with fish worker groups Where there is known engagement with fisher, migrant, and worker rights groups, describe how this occurs and the organisations engaged with workers in the Unit of Assessment (UoA). Where a collective bargainaing agreement (CBA) exists the ship-owners engage collectively with workers's representative organisations (Unions). An example is the Netherlands where the ship-owners of the PFA UoC entertain a CBA for their crew of EU nationalities and another CBA for non-EU off-shore fishers. The counterpart for both CBA's is a Dutch trade union. 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# 3 Appendix – Guidance on filling in the Certificate Holder Forced and Child Labour Policies, Practices and Measures Template

### 3.1 Composition of the fishery client group on behalf of who the statement is provided

If a fishery is in full assessment and the cost-sharing participants and arrangements are not yet determined, provide as much detail as possible regarding the expected cost-sharing entities that will comprise the client group, should the fishery achieve certification, and the relationship between such client group representatives and the vessel owners and operators in the Unit of Certification (UoC).

# 3.2 Responsibility for labour regulation

Provide information on laws and regulation and the authorities that have responsibility for labour regulations in the area in which the fishery operates, including flag state authorities where this is applicable. Describe how these are enforced.

# 3.3 Risk identification, mitigation and remediation

The information required in this section includes information known by the certificate holder on processes and practices that are applicable in the UoC to identify, assess, prevent and mitigate forced and child labour risks. The information may include government policy or measures, or where applicable, measures being implemented by the certificate holder.

#### 3.4 Crew recruitment

The information required here includes information on the methods used to recruit crew in the UoC, any widespread use of migrant labour, the countries that crew come from and information on recruitment agencies used where this information is available and known to the certificate holder. It may also include information known of visa programs used to bring in workers to the UoC and on payment of recruitment fees.

#### 3.5 Engagement with fish worker groups

In some countries, there may be engagement with fish worker groups or other types of organisations that work to address risks of forced labour. Where this occurs provide information on such engagement. This may include information on any organizations in the port area which support crew members socially, e.g. seafarers' ministry, fishers' association, local committees.

#### 3.6 Crew contracts

Contracts are legal work agreements with labour duties and payments clearly spelled out. Describe the nature of crew contracts in the UoC, specifically features related to forced and child labour, whether the contracts are written in languages understood by crew and how provisions in the contract are enforced.

#### 3.7 Audits and labour inspections

Describe any government labour inspections or social audits and certifications of working conditions within the UoC in the past 2 years. Where the information is available provide a link to the criteria against which the audit took place.

# 3.8 National minimum age requirements

For this section describe national minimum age requirements and provide a description of regulatory and private sector systems in place to confirm that minimum age restrictions are met. # 3.9 Repatriation

#### 3.10 Debt bondage

Deductions for costs of work from pay can cause debt bondage and put crew at risk of forced labour. Examples of such work costs include costs of getting to work, placement/broker fee, medical costs, safety gear, food at the workplace, remittance fees and repatriation costs.

# 3.11 Grievance and remedy mechanisms
