1 Proposed variation

We are due to undertake a site visit for several ISF Iceland fisheries between April 11th and 14th 2022 in Reykjavík, Iceland. The assessments that this VR relates to are presented in the table below. This variation is to allow the Principle 1 assessor (Giuseppe Scarcella) and one of the Principle 2 assessors (Efthymia Tsitsika) to attend the site visit remotely while the other team members including the team leaders will attend in person.

Also, to allow the meeting with the eNGOs to be held by conference call, with the full team attending remotely.

The site visit is scheduled for the 11th to 14th April 2022 in Reykjavík, Iceland. The Principle 1 assessor (Giuseppe Scarcella) and Principle 2 assessor (Efthymia Tsitsika) advised the lead assessor that they will not be able to travel during the period proposed for the site visit.

The two eNGO representatives available to meet the assessment team are not based in Iceland and may not be available to meet with the team during the period proposed for the site visit and so a remote meeting is being scheduled.

Global Trust Certification determines that the assessment will not be adversely affected by the Principle 1 and 2 assessor attending the site visit remotely and by the assessment team meeting with the eNGO representatives via conference call. An assessment of the information availability and ability to verify information remotely is presented in the Table below.

Sufficient communication capability to effectively plan, conduct interviews and facilitate information sharing.

There are ample opportunities and mechanisms to engage with clients and stakeholders and exchange information, including by email, via links to websites and electronic forms of communication such as conference calls which have been extensively and successfully used during the covid-19 restriction period for ISF Iceland audits.

English is the common language spoken by the client and stakeholders during audits. All the assessment team members are native/fluent English speakers therefore the assessment team is able to clearly exchange information with the client and stakeholders and to be clearly understood by all parties.

Based on the above, Global Trust Certification determines that the ability to verify information remotely is high. Therefore, having the Principle 1 assessor and one of the Principle 2 assessors attending the site visit remotely and the assessment teams meeting with the eNGO representatives via conference call is considered as a low risk. The assessment teams' ability to deliver a robust stakeholder consultation process would not be impaired.

4 Implications for assessment

The Principle 1 assessor (Giuseppe Scarcella) and one of the Principle 2 assessors (Efthymia Tsitsika) will attend the site visit remotely while the other team members will attend in person. The meeting with the eNGO representative will be held by conference call, with the full team attending remotely.

Global Trust Certification has not identified negative implications determining that the ability to verify information remotely is high.

5 Mitigation of the implication for assessment

Given that negative implications have not been identified, mitigation is not necessary.

6 How many conditions does the fishery have and will their progress be affected (positive or negative)?

Conditions open in each fishery under assessment are shown in the table below. None are due to be closed in this audit. Their progress will not be affected (positively or negatively) by the Principle 1 assessor and one of the Principle 2 assessors attending the site visit remotely, nor by the assessment teams meeting with the eNGO representatives via conference call.
