

Statement that the fishery is within scope and other factors

The fishery entering assessment meets the scope requirements (FCR 7.4) for MSC fishery assessments [FCR 7.8.3.1].

- The fishery is within scope of the MSC standard, (i.e. it does not operate under a controversial unilateral exemption to an international agreement, use destructive fishing practices, target amphibians, birds, reptiles or mammals and is not overwhelmed by dispute);
- The fishery was first certified in August 2011;
- The fishery comprises 39 vessels, targeting king prawns (Penaeus (Melicertus) latisulcatus) operating within a limited geographical area, using twin rig otter trawl;
